NNC Pep Squad





Action Against Hunger Ministry



Action Against Hunger's mission this year was to make a better impact on the campus, community, and the world as a whole. To meet this objective, a myriad of tasks were planned.

On the campus, we helped the students become more aware of the food waste. We put fliers on tables and made bulletin boards to make students more conscious of what they waste. We helped Marriott by weighing the amount of food wasted during a typical meal. The results turned out positive.

In the world, we planned a trip to Los Angeles for a Spring Break Work and Witness trip. After many fund raisers and requests to local churches for help, we decided that the Los Angeles idea was too far and we wanted to make an impact a little closer to home. We then looked to Portland, Oregon, and made contact with local missions and churches to see if there were needs. The response was: "We have many needs, can you help?" We began making detailed plans for Portland and the Work and Witness trip was set in stone.

Our base was a non-denominational Oregon City church. For a week, we worked in two missions located in the Burnside subdivision of Portland, a men's shelter and a women's shelter. We painted, cleaned, painted, organized, cooked, painted and even hosted a picnic for the women at the park near the river.

We originally planned to experience shelter life by sleeping in the shelters, but we felt that it was not safe. The top floor of the women's shelter was not owned by the shelter, and there were prostitutes and drug deals taking place. We ate most of our meals at the men's

shelter and some at the other shelter. Don't let anyone ever tell you that shelter food is terrible. We met a cook and he told us that he was a graduate from the Master school of Culinary. He somehow lost everything he had and he ate at this shelter. Finally, he asked them if they needed an extra hand. He is one of the best cooks there. Portland has a good system for giving food to the shelters. The shelters have a right to all the food in grocery stores that have passed the expiration date for freshness. This system works very well. We saw basketfuls of food brought in every day.

In the community, we gave the rest of our remaining funds to the Mercy House. They needed funds to help keep the house looking nice with paint and yardwork.

We fulfilled our objective for this year by impacting the campus, the world, and the community. However, we do not have enough support from NNC student body and will have to go inactive for next year. Our club definitely took some blows during the forum at the beginning of the year, and as a result, members of the club this year who made a significant impact to the NNC campus will have to go silent for a year to get the bad effects of this incident behind us. 
Men's Volleyball



These talented men hosted a fundraiser in the fall. They sold T-shirts at the state high school volleyball tournament.




Soon enough, freshmen class officer elections came and the

1:05pm: Well, maybe I'll stop into Kelly's room first.


2:45pm: I cannot believe what she just told me! I just have to tell Christy . . .

“is truly the glittering jewel of central Oregon. The company and night-life were exquisite.”




Northwest Nazarene College. Wetmore is taking on the position of President of Nazarene Theological Seminary.

Faculty


Northwest Nazarene College, according to the mission statement in the college catalog, "is a Christian liberal arts college, fully committed to an educational process that pursues both intellectual and spiritual development. This pursuit is centered firmly in the Person of Jesus Christ, and is designed to instill a habit of mind that enables each student to become God's creative and redemptive agent in today's world." The faculty here at N.N.C. believes that we are at

the vital center of the fulfillment of this crucial institutional mission. Faculty life, when pursued seriously and consistently, necessarily includes duties and responsibilities that allow the professor and student alike to assist NNC in the realization of the mission to which it is committed; this year, once again, has witnessed such an endeavor.

In the last two years, after an even longer period of planning and debate among the faculty, a new and needed internal campus governance system has been implemented. This significant development in faculty rights and responsibilities for internal governance entails more hard work on the part of the faculty, and my colleagues have risen to the occasion. The job of a professor here at NNC encompasses much more than merely showing up to hold class several times during the week: preparation before class sessions is time-consuming; student advising is critical; committee work (while perhaps a necessary evil) is still necessary; and other scholarly work, such as writing and research, is seriously

sought after, too. As a result, an already hard-working group of talented and committed faculty with whom I have the pleasure and privilege of working has taken one more essential step toward the fulfillment of NNC's mission.

Each academic year brings its own, unique (and often completely unexpected) challenges, opportunities and rewards. Professors retire; new ones join the NNC faculty. Professors take academic leave in order to further their education; others take needed and deserved sabbaticals. To cite a few examples (at the risk of leaving out others that are equally worthy) of key events involving some of my colleagues this academic year: Professor Ron Ponsford and his colleagues on the Curriculum Committee have performed yeoman labor helping the faculty study our academic program; Professor Gilbert Ford has been named this year's NNC "Teacher of the Year;" Professors Dennis Wall and a Marilyn Thompson have once again led the Speech and Debate program to regionally and nationally recognized levels of excellence. Professor Irving Lai continues to inspire in his students a mission and vision for America's urban centers. Obviously, I could go on and provide myriad examples of other faculty




colleagues who have written books or monographs, delivered papers at conferences, reworked courses and academic programs, advised students, and who, on "simply" a daily basis, push and prod the college to live up to its mission statement.



Editor's Closing
