Lent: Tracing the Tradition

Lent, the forty days which lead up to Easter, is an observance that many Christians value. The word Lent comes from a variety of Anglo-Saxon and Germanic words meaning spring, which is a time of renewal. For Christians, Lent is not a celebration of nature, but a process of prayer and spiritual renewal. It is typically known as the time when people give something up, but there is much more to Lent than this simple tradition.

Originally, in the first century, Lent was observed as a forty hour period, in honor of the forty hours that Jesus' body was in the tomb. In the third century, this evolved into the six days of Holy Week, and then grew to thirty-six days. Finally, during the reign of Charlemagne in the eighth century, four days were added to create the celebration that we have today.

Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday, is a time of preparation, penitence, and for special prayer. The season is set aside for Christians to examine themselves and reflect upon their relationship with God. It is a time of fasting and self-denial

as one considers the suffering and sacrifice that Christ made when He died. The discipline of giving something up is to strip away the things that clutter one's life and take away from time that could be spent in prayer.

Many spend extra time in prayer during Lent. The traditional symbol for this special prayer is the pretzel. This originated when fifth century Christians mixed together dough, salt, and water, which they shaped into the form of two crossed arms to remind themselves to pray. They first called this product little arms or braccellae, and later began to call it brezel or pretzel. The pretzel was only eaten during the season of Lent, as a reminder to pray.

Many members of the Trevecca community have chosen to observe Lent, and have given up things such as a favorite food or activity in order to spend more time focusing on God, praying, or reading the Bible. David and Summer Kemp have given up watching television. "It's something that we love to do, and we gave it up because Jesus gave up his life for us," explained Summer, who also gave up sweet tea. The couple has spent the

extra time reading or just having some quality time together.

Lent will come to a close on Easter Sunday, as the world celebrates the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Christian ska for your Buck

Listen up all you Christian ska fans! There's a new guy on the block, or should I say six new guys. Tattoo Records has just added a rookie to the roster, and their name is Buck.

What's to be expected of this fresh new ska band out of Michigan? They follow in the tradition of secular bands such as Mighty Mighty Bosstones, and Reel Big Fish. They claim Christian influences such as FIF, The O.C. Supertones, and the Insyderz. They mix up a touch of reggae, a bit of punk, and hint of jazz and rap to create a whole bundle of third wave ska.

Buck has traveled for some time in the Great Lakes region. Their goal: to proclaim the Gospel to unbelievers and doubting Christians.

But what about their music? Buck lives up to their claim of following in the steps of bands such as the Supertones. The CD is strictly third wave. In layman's terms: it is similar to all Christian and radio-play ska.

The band finds its forte, however, in its swinging sound. They tease with a couple upbeat swing tracks, similar to bands such as The Royal Crown Revue. If you're not Nazarene, they might get you movin'.

The lyrics remain "fun" at best. Buck is unable to tap the point where ska meets scripture. They convey the gospel with lines such as:

Next came the preacher man,
and said I don't think I can
I don't have the time
It's not such a heinous crime.

Buck's downfall is not their talent, but their lack of creativity. To the "un-ska-ed" ear, each track sounds the same. They do not pioneer any new ground in the way of ska or Christian music. They are not a "heinous crime" but it appears they can not quite fit the giant footprints of the bands that they attempt to follow. If they had of been on the front end of this ska movement, they might have created tracks of their own.

If you are real fan of Christian ska, you may be pleased with this new release. If you are a real fan of ska, prepare to be thoroughly disappointed. So walk - don't run - to the CD store for Buck. They'll be plenty left by the time you get there.

It is by far the most popular of Shakespeare's work, but what makes *Romeo & Juliet* so appealing? Dr. Janie McCauley, professor in the Dramatic Production Department of Bob Jones University, attempted to bring some insight to that question in the most recent Cultural Arts Forum, which was held on Saturday, March 20.

Through the comparison of different TV and movie versions of the play, Dr. McCauley pointed out how each different generation relates it to the current cultural and political climate. Clips from the productions helped prove her point. Sections were shown from a 1940's version, the popular version of the 60's, and a more recent BBC production.

Dr. McCauley also delved into the reasoning behind the play, discussing the question of why the main characters were "doomed". The forum showed that the story is not just a tale about young love, and encouraged the hearer to see the play in a different light the next time around.
