Summer Apartment Policies Questioned

On Wednesday, March 27th, many students in the Trevecca community were surprised to discover just how expensive college apartment life could become. University Officials raised the apartment rate from \$450.00 per month, which was split between the roommates, to a \$13.00 per night charge for each person staying in the apartments.

"I thought it was very unfair," said Michelle Fite, Redford Apartments Resident Director.

As seen from the various ICE page messages and the gneral mood throughout the campus,

the students who were planning to live in the apartments were livid. The university was raising the apartment fee by nearly \$170.00 per person, per month.

"I felt it was absolutely absurd in having such a high increase in the rent," said Brooks Whitlow, sophomore. "However, I was very impressed with the administrations prompt response."

According to Ronda Lillienthal, Assistant Dean of Residential Life, the committee who made the decision was simply trying to bring the price up to where it should be. Their justification: the fact that a residence hall pass is currently \$13.00 for a non-school night and the apartments, which provide cooking facilities, was only costing residents approximately \$7.50 per night.

"Money was not even an issue with the decision," said Lillienthal. "We were trying to be fair, compared with the cost of living in the dorms."

While the decision was reserved the next day, there is still a key issue to be worked out between the curent apartment residents and administration. When the

students left for Easter break, the committee was yet to come to a decision in regards to allowing three people in an apartment over the summer.

Currently, the apartments house three students during the school year. Many residents would like to be able to keep this arrangement through the summer, however the school is currently only allowing two students per apartment. If this decision is not reversed as well, it could create some interesting situations in seeing who will need to move.

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Are We Really Responsible Adults?

"[Trevecca Nazarene University] intends that its graduates be persons of strong Christian character who are able to make ethical decisions based on biblical principles. Their characteristics should include competence, responsibility, compassion, and the ability to integrate Christian faith and learning in practice."

The above statement is a direct quote from TNU's Statement of Purpose. We, as students, are consistently told that morality and modesty are essential to a liberal arts education at a Christian university. We are expected to act like adults, and to exhibit that we are capable of independently making decisions that correspond with our ethical, and more importantly, biblical principles. We are trusted to make innumerable decisions determining our careers, from planning our class schedules to choosing an appropriate internship. In my experience, more often than not, students end up advising themselves and while this teaches a certain amount of responsibility, with responsibility should come privileges.

In light of all this, the issue I have to address may seem somewhat trivial. However, that is the point. Visitation policies on campus, both in the dorms and apartments, have been the topic of discussion among many. These "discussions," though, typically end with the bottom line being "that's the way it is."

RA/RD assessments last semester actually went so far as to ask

students' preference on visitation hours, but that was all that was ever heard. To my knowledge, results of that particular poll were never announced and visitation days and hours stayed exactly the same, without any acknowledgment that the question was ever asked.

Students are trusted, even encouraged, to undertake several dilemmas that, in the "real world" are considered "adult." It seems somewhat contradicting then, that when it comes to ethical decisions, campus rules dictate that those same students are incapable of having the opposite gender in their rooms more than one night and one afternoon (at best) per week.

My intention is not to provoke yet another fruitless argument about abolishing all rules. I believe that administration has put a lot of thought and work into establishing the standards by which the campus runs. I merely present this issue to illustrate the inconsistency in the implementation of these standards.

For instance, I have heard oncampus apartments referred to as "honors housing." This term implies that residents are allowed certain privileges and freedoms they do not receive living in the dorms. Residing in the apartments is a welcome change from dormlife, but certain aspects of it seem contradicting.

(For example, why should apartment occupants be required to purchase a meal plan at all if we have use of a full kitchen? The prospect of buying groceries seems almost a burden on top of the cafeteria fee. But that's a topic for another editorial.) Visitation hours are established for apartment-

dwellers, but merely setting those hours has not limited students to practice visitation rights exclusively within those specified hours.

Resident directors do not check, nor should they be expected to, during those hours to make sure that the opposite gender is gone by the appropriate time. The point is that students should be adult enough to finish any conversation or movie or "visitation" by the assigned hour. The problem is generally not in the lateness of the visitation hours, but in the days and frequency of allowed times. The rotating schedule is simply too confusing, and unless you frame and hang that single sheet of paper given out at the beginning of the semester, chances are you're going to forget the allotted day for that week. Or, if you're like me, you'll check it only to find out that open house was the day before.

The solution to this is simple. Keep visitation the same every week. I realize this may occasionally interfere with student schedules, but at least you would always know what night visitation falls on the next week, so you can plan accordingly. Honestly, the idea of more than one visitation night per week is not unreasonable. Students in the apartments are considered mature enough to accept the consequences of their actions, but they are not mature enough to handle more than one night a week of visitation privileges?

Just to clarify-I'm not suggesting

a 24-hour, 7 day a week visitation policy. This could simply be conceived as co-ed dorms and that goes against standards that Trevecca is trying to promote. However, why couldn't certain hours of certain days be consistently labeled "visitation hours." With the introduction of RAs to each breezeway next semester, any "monitoring" that needs to be done will be done. If RAs are going to be put in each breezeway, there should be a reason to have them there, so why not increase visitation hours and days? Not that the RAs should have to stand with an ear at each doorway, but having them there simply solves the problem that one person is not enough to enforce the rules for all the apartments.

If the intent is willful enough, all the rules in the world are not going to keep students from doing what they please. Whatever "horrendous sins" that are supposedly always going to be committed under the mask of darkness are just as likely to occur during the day. And not just in the living areas. But that doesn't mean that all students wishing for a more lenient visitation policy are advocating immoral behavior. It seems somewhat immature to base visitation guidelines on the premise that students cannot maintain modesty while in the company of a member of the opposite sex. Too often, it is subconsciously impressed upon us that males and females must view each other as potential partners in order to be close. Despite popular belief (and the "ring by spring"

Three Trojan softball players were named TranSouth's player of the week during March.

Rone' Phelps, a sophomore from Nolensville, Tennessee was named Player of the Week for the week ending March 17. The 5'5" shortstop knocked in the Lady Trojans winning run in their 4-1 upset of #9 Athens State. Phelps was 7-for-14 (.500), with four doubles, four RBI, had a stolen base and scored three runs on that week.

Hollie Shane, a freshman from Goodlettsville, TN and Jami Toomey, a freshman from Nashville, were selected as the TranSouth Athletic Conference Players of the Week for the week ending March 24, 2002.

Shane attended Davidson Academy in Nashville where she earned All-State honors her senior year. The 5'8" right-hander was 2-0 for the week with a 4-3 win at Martin Methodist College and a 2-1 win over #3 Union University. In the win at Martin Methodist Shane pitched a complete game with 3 strikeouts, 4 walks, 9 hits, and only 2 earned runs. In the win over #3 Union, Shane again went the distance with 4 strikeouts, 1 walk, 7 hits, and only 1 earned run.

Toomey played for Ezell-Harding Academy in the Nashville area where she was a member of 5 consecutive Class A State Championship teams. Toomey finished the week 8for-21 (.381) from the plate with 7 RBI, 6 runs, a double, a triple, and a homerun. Toomey was key in Trevecca's sweep of #3 Union. Toomey went 1-3 with a run scored in the 2-1 victory over Union. In game two Toomey knocked in 3 runs, scored 2, and had a 3run homer. In Trevecca's 4-3 win at Martin Methodist Toomey was 2-4 with a triple, 2 RBI, and 2 runs scored.

Lady Trojans Finish Successful Season

The Trevecca women's basketball team has completed another successful year under the leadership of Coach Julie Van Beek. The combination of solid leadership from four seniors in Sara Menees, Ashley Boykin, Stephanie Arnett, and Jamie Mills, new talent from three freshmen and a sophomore in Leah Thornton, Leslie Golden, and Lindsey Fly, and athletic ability from junior stars Charity Williams, Ramona Moga and Jennifer Wilson all added up to a tough all around team that conference opponents feared.

The Lady Trojans began the season in fine fashion going 10-4 before beginning conference play. All four losses were to ranked teams. By the time mid-January rolled around, the Lady Trojans found themselves ranked 1st in the conference in shooting, 1st in three-point shooting, and second in free-throw percentage. As a team Trevecca was ranked 18th in the NAIA and began to break both team and individual records.

The women earned individual honors as well. Senior forward Stephanie Arnett added to her already record-breaking career rebounding total, finishing with 86 on the year, giving her a total of 588 rebounds in her career at Trevecca.



Collins Named Player of the Week

Region XI and the TranSouth Athletic Conference announced Trevecca's own Chris Collins as Player of the Week for the week ending March 24, 2002.

Chris Collins, a 6'0"senior from Tucson, AZ, finished the week 11-20 (.550) at the plate with 11 RBI, 5 runs scored, a double, and 4 home runs. Collins leads the TranSouth with 10 home runs for the year and hit one in each of the first three games with #24 Union this week. In Trevecca's 10-0 upset win over Union, Collins was 3-4 with a home run.

Trevecca finished the week 3-3, including an upset of



#24 Union. Trevecca improved its overall record to 14-15 and 4-4 in TranSouth Athletic

added to her already recordbreaking career points total finishing the season with 526 points giving her a total of 1,596 points in her 3 year TNU career. Wilson also broke the season freethrow record, shooting 83.2% from the charity stripe.

Senior Ashley Boykin also added to her point total scoring 361 points on the year, putting her in second place for all-time scoring at Trevecca with 1,296 career points. Also, Boykin finished ranked 1st in the TranSouth Conference and 7th in the NAIA in three-point percentage. Boykin's three-point percentage was good enough to break the TNU season record shooting 42.6% from behind the arc. Junior Lady Trojan star Charity Williams had a record-breaking year as well. Williams shattered season rebounding records by grabbing 199 defensive rebounds, 268 total rebounds, and averaging 8.4 rebounds per game; all are new records. Williams also had 45 blocks on the season, breaking the old record by 10.

As the season came to a close, the Lady Trojans finished the regular season ranked second in the conference and did the same in the conference tournament, sending the ladies to another NAIA tournament appearance, this time ranked #13.

The Lady Trojans finished the winning many TranSouth and NAIA honors. Junior Jennifer Wilson was named to the NAIA First Team All-American, and sophomore Lindsey Fly made the NAIA Second Team All-American. Fly was also named the TranSouth Newcomer of the Year and made the All-TranSouth First Team along with Jennifer Wilson. Senior Ashley Boykin also was honored with a spot on the All-TranSouth Second Team, and freshman Ashlie Gilland made the TranSouth All-Freshman Team. Four Lady Trojans earned Academic All-American honors. Jamie Mills, Stephanie Arnett, Sara Menees, and Jennifer Wilson. This was the third year in a row for Mills and the second in a row for Arnett.

As the Lady Trojans look ahead to next season, they will lose 4 key seniors, yet with a strong off season work ethic, the Lady Trojans look to return a powerful offensive and defensive line up and hope to complete another successful season.
