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## Dr. Vanderpool Is Speaker at Ministerial Association Luncheon

Speaking to a group of forty-two prospective pastors, missionaries and evangelists who were gathered in the T-room Friday, February 25, for the Ministerial Association luncheon, Dr. Vanderpool challenged them to do their best to pass "Our wonderful Heritage" on to succeeding generations. Calling attention to the fact that there are about 7,000 ministers to 4,000 Nazarene churches, Dr. Vanderpool stated that there is a wonderful field of opportunity for those who do not now have a settled place of pastorate. With 300,000 Nazarenes around the world, he paraphrased our school motto by saying, "The sun never sets on the Church of the Nazarene." Dr. Vanderpool said that the heritage we have is a "cluster of gems that make us rich." Some of those gems are: a church home; the cardinal doctrine of entire sanctification, which has been tested and proven

and is more firmly founded today than ever before, appealing to the human heart; wonderful fellowship with God's people; freedom to preach the gospel, as assured in the Bill of Rights. Another important point which the speaker emphasized was the source of that heritage which is Jesus Christ. The founders of our church invested their lives to give to us the heritage we enjoy. He told a very moving story how Dr. R. T. Williams was awakened several times in one night by the tramp-tramping of many feet and a voice told him that it was the "tramping of souls on the way to judgment." He closed by saying that we, as Christian workers, should be expendable for the kingdom. The group stood and softly sang "Near the Cross," their hearts touched and challenged to go forward in giving their lives for the gospel.

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### Faultfinding Is Futile

Like a dart hurled briskly into a water-filled balloon, piercing words spoken to people may wound them, cause them to give up, and possibly drive them away from salvation.

Cutting criticism may be powerful. The intention does not always match the result; it may spread so far and sink so deeply that its effect will reach past the one who was criticized, and, in turn, nail a terrific blow on the one who did the fault-finding. It may puncture the reputation on both sides, creating friction and injuring character.

Let us closely observe the results. Does it inspire others to follow your own way of thinking? No, it merely brings discouragement which may result in enmity. Do you get satisfaction from releasing cutting remarks to others? No, it readily leads to more fault-finding in order to back up the previous words. Does it develop your character and draw you closer to the Lord? Faultfinding serves as one of the easiest channels for a downfall in spirituality. There is no profit, no advantage in this type of criticism. We must take the Bible's advice, "swift to hear, slow to speak . . ." and thus grow in grace and wisdom.

### Helen Health

I've been told that at last some of you are beginning to realize just how important I really am. So I've decided to give you some more advice to help you stay "in good" with me.

Keep your skin clean and attractive looking. The skin is a vital organ, like the heart or kidneys, doing special work which is necessary to life and health. One of its important jobs is to act as a bulwark between the inside of the body and the world outside, and so it gets rough usage.

Many germs live on it. Ordinarily, these germs are harmless, but when conditions are favorable, some may gang up and cause boils or pimples. A clean, unbroken skin is unfriendly to germs. Cleanliness helps the skin to fight off infection.

A clean skin is also essential to a good complexion and good grooming. The skin is constantly exposed to dirt. A small amount of perspiration is always being secreted—even during cold weather or when you are sitting still. Oil from the oil glands in the skin also collects on the surface.

You can help your skin to get rid of these dried-up secretions by an all-over scrub with warm water and plenty of soap. Your skin will be healthier and better looking if you do this every day. Soap and water make an excellent antiseptic.

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
### Bell Is Traditional

Chambers spoke on "A Life in Review" on February 18. When Paul looked back over his life he could say he had fought a good battle and had kept the faith. Life is a battle but it is a challenge to us.

Our series of lectures sponsored by John T. Benson, Jr., in honor of his father, John T. Benson, St., a faithful sponsor of Trevecca, began on February 21 with Dr. D. I. Vanderpool as the speaker. Dr. Vanderpool is one our general superintendents and is noted for his evangelistic spirit.


