Chapel Service

On the following Tuesday we were privileged to hear Rev. Everett Howard, a returned missionary from Cape Verde Islands now working on the Texas-Mexican district. Bro. Howard vividly portrayed the need and the victories won on Cape Verde Island. The job of a Protestant missionary in these islands was not easy as the Cape Verdes had been held in Catholicism for four hundred years. Our hearts were thrilled with such stories as the one of the little Cape Verdian Nazarene Church which was spared during an earthquake on the Island of Fire. We left chapel with more of a missionary zeal in our hearts.

On Wednesday Dean L. P. Gresham spoke on "The Revival of Conscience." This message brought many interesting events to our mind from times of the past.

On the following day another member of our faculty, Professor Greathouse, brought a lecture on Martin Luther and the Protestant Reformation. It was brought out that the main contribution of his Reformation was the substitution

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Dean Writes For Herald

In a recent issue of *Herald of Holiness* an article appeared which was written by Dean L. P. Gresham. "Through the Eyes of Succeeding Generations" effectively portrays the contagious influence that John Wesley had in his century. The article was one of several included in this issue of the *Herald*.

In his article Dr. Gresham not only presented his personal ideas of Wesley's influence, but brought in quotations from personalities of the past. He quoted the English poet Southey, "I consider Wesley as the most influential mind of the last century, the man who will have produced the greatest effects centuries or millenniums hence."

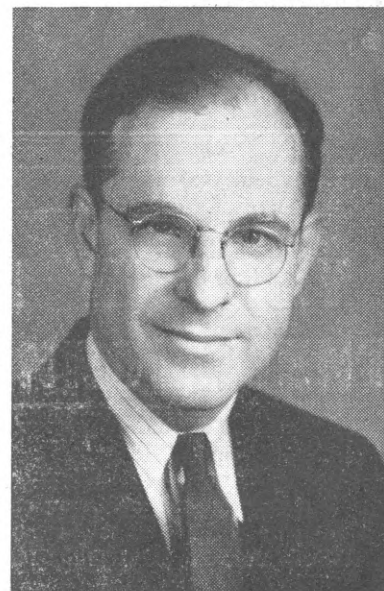

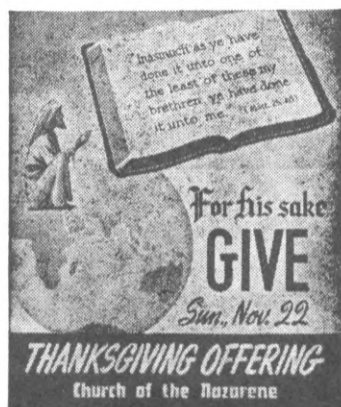

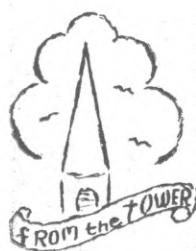
Is "Ike" Losing Popularity

Martin P. Durkin resigned as Secretary of Labor as a result of the President's failure in considering the repealing of the Taft-Hartley Law. Unfortunately for Eisenhower a vast number of people have had a similar feeling to that of Durkin. Then Ezra Taft Benson, Secretary of Agriculture, has been under political fire for some time. His plan for the farmers is not going over as well as the Administration would like. These indifferences that are salient in the government have helped greatly to deteriorate the popularity of the administration, and the blame tends to go to the President.
