

Dr. Lela McConnell Is Chapel Speaker

Dr. Lela G. McConnell, founder of the Kentucky Mountain Holiness Association, was guest chapel speaker February 29. This institution had its beginning thirty-two years ago. It was, and still is, financed entirely by faith in God. Miss McConnell has suffered many hardships, but through much prayer and fasting and simple faith in God she has seen great things accomplished.

Several out-post schools and a radio station are connected with the school and are able to reach many people with the gospel. Hundreds of young people—including murderers, drunkards—have found definite victory in regeneration and sanctification and are now bearers of the gospel.

The Circuit Judge of Kentucky told Miss McConnell that her Bible School had done more for the citizens in ten years than the law had done in two hundred.
