Representatives from the various Nazarene colleges including the Theological Seminary were present. From Trevecca were Dr. Mackey, Rev. V. Neil Richardson, Rev. Keys and Dr. Gresham. In Monday's chapel service Dr. Mackey reported that they left the conference with faith, hope and confidence for the future.

Finish The Work

As the freshman student enters college he very frequently encounters great difficulty in adjusting himself to his new environment. He suddenly finds himself among strangers, perhaps in a city far from his home, and all too frequently this same student decides to give up the idea of higher education. The student is facing one of the first really big decisions of his adult life. Should he leave college and get a mediocre job with an underpaid salary, or should he make a noble decision and remain in the class-room? The decision is his to make.

Let us consider the advantages of a normal education. A college education is a great help in developing one's personality. Especially in a Christian college does the student have special spiritual and social aids. A college education is essential for many types of vocational success. It is obvious that the amount of education you get largely determines what type of occupation you will eventually enter. If you are a college graduate, you will probably go into one of the professions or into a business that will afford opportunity to rise to an executive position. On the other hand, if the student drops out of college in his freshman year, or even in his junior year, he does not have enough formal training to
