### Is Chapel Speaker

The students of Trevecca were privileged last week to hear Dr. George Frame, president of Hurlet Nazarene College in the British Isles. Dr. Frame is district superintendent in the northern part of the British Isles, and has served on the General Board of the Church for eighteen years. He was born in Glasgow, Scotland, and received his M.A. degree at Glasgow University. Since coming here in October he has toured some of the districts and presented several lectures to the Seminary in Kansas City.

On Wednesday of last week Dr. Frame brought a deep, inspiring message on heart purity. "Purity is power," he said. "One must be pure to really know God." On Thursday he told of the marvellous revival in Scotland. Trevecca students were glad to have Dr. Frame and we trust he will have a safe trip to the British Isle following the General Board Meeting in January.

## Church News Seminar To Be In January

A seminar on religious journalism sponsored by The Nashville Tennessean will be held in a down-town auditorium, January 14.

Roland E. Wolseley of Syracuse, N. Y., authority on religious journalism, will discuss the relation of the pulpit and the press. He is co-author of the textbook, *Exploring Journalism*, currently being used in the journalism class at Trevecca.

One workshop will be devoted to discussion of What Is News? What Subjects Make Good Feature Articles?, How To Gather News, and Writing Releases.

At the invitation of James Carty, church news editor for The Tennessean, Mrs. K. W. Phillips met Thursday, December 10 with representatives of Nashville churches and church-related colleges in a planning conference for the seminar.

## Global Glimpses Steps Toward Peace

Last week President Eisenhower met with Great Britain's Prime Minister, Winston Churchill and France's Premier, Joseph Laniel in Tucker's Town, Bermuda. The Big Three conference included discussions on how to bring sure peace in Korea; and also other problems of the Far East were discussed. The Big Three also agreed to meet with Russia sometime later for a Big Four conference.

Within hours after the Bermuda conference, President Eisenhower delivered a historical address to the United Nations General Assembly. He challenged the Soviets to join in the pool for peace. He warned the nations of the potency of the atomic bomb. "My Country's purpose is to help us move out of this dark chamber of horrors into the light," the President said solemnly. He stated that he knew that many steps will have to be taken before the world can truly realize that "a new climate of mutually peaceful confidence is abroad in the world," but that those steps must be taken "now." One high UN official hailed the speech as the greatest development in American foreign policy since 1946.

Besides negotiations with international affairs, President Eisenhower still finds considerable friction in the administration. One day last week GOP National Chairman Leonard Hall tried to persuade Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) to refrain from attacking Eisenhower and other leaders of the administration. In a nation-wide radio and TV speech the senator criticized Eisenhower's foreign policy and declared that he is not taking the stand he should in regard to communists in government. Hall argued that McCarthy's attacks were merely helping the Democrats. McCarthy is beginning to agree, for he plans to have a personal talk with the President, hoping to have a better understanding with him and the administration. Hence, the McCarthy-Eisenhower controversy.
