### Board, Faculty, Students Honor President Mackey

The Board of Trustees of Trevecca Nazarene College unanimously re-elected Dr. A. B. Mackey to the presidency of Trevecca College. Following their decision which was announced Wednesday morning at the daily chapel service, a tremendous ovation was given Dr. Mackey by faculty, students and visitors.

The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of Trevecca Nazarene College was held on the campus April 27, with Dr. E. C. Oney, chairman, presiding.

Dr. Oney did not consent to his name being placed in nomination for chairman again. Dr. Knight was elected Chairman of the Board for the coming year; Dr. Oney, Vice-Chairman; Dr. Stucki, Secretary; Rev. Claude W. Galloway, Treasurer.

There was a wonderful spirit of unity at all times, and everyone seemed to be enthusiastic and optimistic over the future of Trevecca. Many favorable comments were made by the members of the Board relative to the improvements on the campus and the spirit of harmony among the faculty and students.

One of the highlights of the Board Meeting was Dr. H. M. Ivy's speech to the Board. He is Director of the Associated Consultants in Education, which is working with us toward membership in the Southern Association of Colleges. Dr. Ivy's information, encouragement and recommendations did much to promote the enthusiastic attitude of the Board. The plan to liquidate the debt by October, 1956, was approved. Already ten of the hundred, one-thousand-dollar units have been pledged. Several campus improvement projects were approved by the Board.

We appreciate the Board members, faculty, students, and friends who have stood by with their prayers.


(Continued from page 1, col. 3) lost to Christ by the question, "Is there not a cause for the number of unchurched people?"

### Crusade for Souls Is Conference Theme

Trevecca students and faculty were privileged to hear Dr. Hardy C. Powers, our Senior General Superintendent, and Dr. Roy F. Smee, General Home Missions Secretary, speak in chapel Tuesday and Wednesday, May 3-4. They, along with Rev. W. A. Strong, pastor from Dayton, Ohio, were the special workers at the "Crusade for Souls Conference" at College Hill Church May 2-4.

Dr. Powers spoke on "Spiritual Embezzlement," warning that Christians are responsible to express their spiritual blessings to the unevangelized and unsaved within their sphere of influence. "We are saved to serve."

In his message on "This is the Answer," Dr. Smee expressed his concern over the failure of the Church of the Nazarene to maintain its early rate of progress and concluded that evangelism is the only answer.
