
Community Concert To Present Artists

This group of ten also serves as an advisory council to the Dean of Students, to keep him informed as to student life needs and interests and to give him their point of view on plans for the future. This group is known as the Residence Halls Council.

Loan Rules Revised

To receive consideration on application for a loan, the application must reach the Business Manager ten days before the beginning of the quarter for which the loan is requested.

The application should include a statement of need for assistance, credit references, the name of the person who will co-sign the note, and the amount requested.

The applicant will be notified approximately five days before the beginning of the quarter concerning the granting of the loan.

Payment of loan funds are to be made in the bookkeeper's office. Quarterly grades will not be recorded until the final payment is made. (If the loan is not paid at maturity a penalty of 2% of the unpaid balance will be added and the loan will draw interest at 6% per annum.)

Any exception to this policy must be approved by the administrative committee of the faculty.
