"We have been able to place 25% of our Careers

Now participants into full time jobs since the beginning of the program. They are great employees. The state and the students are very privileged to have this opportunity," said Ann Taylor-Tharpe, Careers Now director.

The program offers experience in many fields for students with various majors including: accounting, computer science, economics, finance, library science, business administration,

English, geoscience, history, journalism, law, marketing, political science, and more.

but he has already lost 14-17 of his siblings to the AIDS virus that is raging in his part of the world. Joshua has not had much schooling, but he has a definite call to the ministry, and his dream for several years has been to attend African Nazarene University. The price of \$1700 per semester is staggering to a young man who makes little money, but he knows that God's Will is for him to attend the school.

In faith, he is already there, getting what is equivalent to our GED so that he can begin his studies there as a ministerial student this fall. He is already a leader among his people, and is respected in his village by everyone from the youngest child to the elders. He plans to

return to Uganda to minister among his people when his studies are completed.

Dr Green hopes that this will become a true missions experience for the entire campus. He stated that what CAUSE is all about is extending ministry to other parts of the world. However, there is nothing in that goal statement that requires us to be there. What the Lord can do through us and through Joshua for the next 50 years is incredible to think about. Knowing that we can have a direct impact and hand in his ministry is an awesome thought.

The Joshua Project has really become a campus wide enterprise. Not only students, but staff members and faculty as well have dug deep into their pockets to help this man who only a handful of people from Trevecca have met. At the employee chapel nearly \$900 was raised, and in the student chapel offering \$500 was raised, the highest amount students have ever given in a single offering.

Other ways to raise funds for Joshua are appearing all over campus—the dorms and apartments are having "Joshua Jars", King's Kids is doing a penny drive, and several clubs, organizations, choirs, and even departmental majors are pitching in as well. To this date \$1977.95 has been raised, which will more than pay for his first semester.

This is the first missions

opportunity in which all of our community has joined efforts. Never before has there been a ministry opportunity that faculty, students, and staff alike have been so passionate about. Dr. Green wonders if we aren't this year setting a precedent, that even when we go back next year to having an actual CAUSE trip that we will still be able to do something like this. This is truly a way to unite the campus for a common goal, and so far it has been very successful.

A final note: If every student on campus gave \$10-15, we as a campus could pay for Joshua's entire education. We could all be encouraged to think and pray about contributing to the effort.


Russell Crowe has done it For the second again. consecutive year, he has managed to capture the attention of not only the average movie fan, but also film critics and Academy members. And it is a little wonder. Crowe has managed to prove his versatility, moving easily from his macho gladiator image to portraying tortured, gangling schizophrenic with startling, yet admirable conviction.

A Beautiful Mind, nominated for an Academy Award for Best Picture, unfurls the true story of John Forbes Nash, Jr., an eccentric brilliant mathematician whose career is disrupted by paranoid schizophrenia. This film is not only the tale of a man's battle to overcome his disability, but a story of unconditional love.

The audience meets Nash as a young Princeton student, brilliant but lacking social skills. An astonishing discovery that revolutionizes economics assists Nash in moving on to teaching at M.I.T. and doing code-breaking work ominous for an government agent (Ed Harris). It is at this time that Nash meets, falls in love with, and marries Alicia, portrayed by Jennifer Connelly in her most convincing role yet. The nightmare begins not long after, though, when Nash's hallucinations are discovered and he is diagnosed the in advanced stages schizophrenia.
