Can the Devil Work Miracles?

IRACLES and prophecy are two of the credentials which God, in centuries past, has given the messenger whom He has sent and to the message which He has given; but if the Devil can work miracles or foretell the future with certainty without building his prophecy upon the facts of the past or the present, then miracles and prophecy are no longer valuable as evidence of the divine appointment of a messenger or of the true inspiration of a message. The predicament is the same as that which believers in "unknown tongues" get into when they first claim that speaking in unknown tongues is evidence of the baptism with the Holy Ghost and then turn right around and admit that the Devil can also give the gift of tongues; for if both God and the Devil can cause people to speak in unknown tongues, then speaking in unknown tongues can be no certain sign of any certain thing/to any one.

But did not Jannes and Jambres withstand Moses at the court of Pharaoh by duplicating the signs which Moses wrought? Does not the Bible admit the existence of witches, wizards, magicians, soothsavers and familiar spirits? Does it not suggest the appearance of signs that will all but deceive the very elect? Our answer is that the Bible accredits only "signs and lying wonders" to human and satanic agencies. Ninety per cent of the "stock in trade" with spiritualists, traffickers with familiar spirits and others who claim "great power" but ignore Jesus Christ and the religion which He brought into the world, is fraud and deceit; the other ten per cent can be explained (every single item of it) and duplicated on the principles of hypnotism and telepathy (both purely human). Every psychic, including the noted Mrs. Stewart of Cleveland, who has attempted to demonstrate their phenomena based upon "communion with disembodied spirits" before committees of scientific men has either utterly failed or has been found guilty of fraud.

The Devil is interested in and complicated with spiritualism just as he is in everything else that is false, fraudulent and calculated to lead men astray from Christ and damn their souls in hell, but, for all that, he does not and cannot work real miracles, but can only counterfeit the real with "signs and *lying* wonders."

¹ So much of "fortune telling and fore-telling" by mediums and other Christ rejectors as is not pure lies or simple guess work is based upon mind reading and is no more closely related to the real prophecy of the Bible than are the "forecasts" of the vacillating weatherman. The subtilities of the mind of man make explanations of the work of psychics exceedingly difficult; but the explanation is there and it does not involve the work of disembodied spirits, human, satanic, or divine. Scientific men have rendered a splendid service to the cause of true Christianity by investigating and exposing the pretensions of "table walkers," "spirit writers," "spiritualistic healers" and other fraudulent folk who offer religion divorced from morality and eternal bliss apart from Christ. Let the investigations go on; Christ and truth and true Christianity are promoted by every honest inspection carried on in the field occupied by "things which are not seen."

In the whole history of the world, none but God has really wrought miracles and none but He has uttered true prophecy of future events, and none but He can ever work these miracles of power or miracles of knowledge; for He alone is Omnipotent and Omniscient: and thus the credentials of Jehovah stand unchallenged by either devils or men, and the man or message whom God approves by these, His chosen means, is unquestionably *divinely* sanctioned.

But power and knowledge represent only the attributes of will and intellect and there is yet one more essential in the adorable, personal God and that is sensibility; and this is just as capable of manifesting its infinity as is either of the other two. However, it is easier for us to conceive of "power to do anything whatsoever," or of "ability to know everything past, present and future" than it is for us to describe "feeling that is infinitely perfect in every sense." But God is positively and absolutely just, true, merciful and good; and this infinite attribute (composed of these four elements) had its supreme manifestationits miracle-in the plan of human redemption which centered in the cross of Christ. That plan and that cross are a true and full expression of God's hatred for sin (justice), His consciousness of His own moral perfection (truth), His sympathy for the personal sinner (mercy), and His preference for His creatures' happiness (goodness). And as the plentitude of God is more fully summed up in His sensibility than in either of the other attributes, so the miracle of miracles was God's gift of His Son for the salvation of men. And just as miracles of power have to do with the bodies of men and miracles of knowledge (prophecy) have to do with the intellects of men, so this miracle of love has to do with the immortal spirits of men; and, therefore, this last is the greatest miracle of all. Greater than the making of a world, greater than the creation of man, greater than all healings of the body, greater than the solution of all mysteries of knowledge is the miracle of redemption. And salvation from all sin here and now is the personal privilege of every one who will willingly decree that Jesus Christ shall not have died in vain.

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TURNING BRASS INTO GOLD

For thousands of years men have dreamed of chemical or mechanical processes that would change baser metals into gold. Only a few months ago the news came out that this was being done in the laboratories of Germany and the suggestion was made that perhaps Germany would offer to pay her war debts with this "synthetic" gold. But the stories have died down and it is likely that they were just "talk," after all. But even should some one succeed in discovering a method for the manufacture of synthetic gold, the discovery would be only of temporary profit, for gold is valuable principally because it is so scarce.

Nevertheless, the greatest work of the world is along the line suggested in the above paragraph. The multiplication of anything on its own plane is by no means comparable to the work of lifting a base thing to a higher plane. This is true whether we refer to turning grass into beef, beef into human muscle and brain or material substances into spiritual realities.

When it has been suggested that one may give money to the work of God until he is impoverished, some have immediately objected and have contended that if we give to God, He will return gifts of the same kind to us and that the actual proof of one's faithfulness in tithing and his liberality in giving is his temporal prosperity. The logical conclusion of the argument would seem to be that the more money you give, the more money you will have until you would finally be menaced with the terrible fact that every thing you touched turned into gold and you would starve and famish because your food and drink turned into gold at your touch.

But I think the teaching of the New Testament is that we may turn the sordid things of earth into eternal riches by devoting them to God. Goods and chattels and money may be exchanged for saved souls and when the former shall "fail," the latter will "receive you into everlasting habitations."

We do not give land to God hoping and expecting that we shall thereby add to our earthly acreage, but with the hope that we may thus add to our "holdings" in the land of green pastures and springing wells. We, do not give gold that we may thus possess more gold, but we give gold that it may be transformed into grace for time and eternity.

HOLINESS A DEFINITE STATE

ITH reference to God himself, it is, of course, true that we are only "relatively" holy. But as it respects sin, holiness is definite and clearly defined. We are either holy or we are not holy. Sin is either entirely gone or else it still remains. But it is the promise of God that "The blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanseth us from ALL sin."

God's command is not that we shall be as nearly holy as possible, or that we should possess as little defilement as we can, but the command is, "Be ye holy for I am holy."

The promise is not that there is a remedy that will make the state of sin more tolerable and that will prevent it being so rampant in its manifestations or quite so assured of its ability to endure, but the promise is that the very God of peace will sanctify you wholly and preserve you spirit and soul and body unto the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ. The prayers of Jesus and of the apostles are not for a diminution of sin within, but they are that we may be sanctified through the truth and that we may be without "spot or wrinkle or any such thing." And the testimonies of the saints are not to a shearing off of the body of sin to the end that its presence may not be so apparent, but they are to the fact that they know the old man was crucified and the body of sin destroyed.

A GOVERNOR'S COOD EXAMPLE

UNDER DATE OF November 24, a Louisville paper published a news item to the effect that Governor-Elect Fields of Kentucky, has announced that he will not attend the inaugural ball scheduled to be held in his honor in the Executive Mansion at Frankfort on the night of Dec. 11: Mr. Fields was said to have been very emphatic in his statement, declaring that if such a ball is held it will not be in the Governor's Mansion, nor will any dancing be permitted there while he is Governor, as neither he nor Mrs. Fields approve of it.

Any person who has intelligence enough to be Governor of a state or President of the United States or Mayor of the smallest village knows also that the practice of dancing is derogatory to public and private morality and it would go a long ways toward offsetting the strenuous effects of shallow worldlings to popularize the dance if all dancing in honor of the inauguration of such officials were prohibited; and I would like to cast my vote for men for all public offices who would take the bold and proper stand that Mr. Fields is reported to have taken.

WE MUST SAVE OUR CHILDREN EARLY

FIGURES WERE RECENTLY made public through "The Federal Council of Churches" which show that, whereas, forty years ago the age at which the largest number join the church was 16.4, it is now 11.9. And investigations show that ten per cent are received before they are ten and forty-three per cent between the ages of ten and fifteen, so that fifty-three per cent who ever join the church do so before they are fifteen.

The figures also show that as many are received into the church between the ages of five and ten as between thirty-five and seventy.

As parents and as people, we could make no greater blunder than to neglect the salvation of our children. With the increase of educational advantages, the age at which children become responsible, may be lowered from even its present low level and we must keep right up with it and save our children before they become hardened through neglect.

A CORRECTION

In the "Questions Answered" column in the issue of Jan. 16th the question was asked whether persons who have been converted and baptized and should backslide and then come back to the Lord should be baptized again. The answer should have been, "No, not under any ordinary circumstances." By mistake the word ordinary was left out and that made the answer stronger than was intended.

Q. Is it right for a Nazarene to do funeral work at a green house on Sunday λ F. S., Wash.

Ans. This would surely be a work of mercy, if not of necessity, and it seems to me a Christian should do it without condemnation.

Q. A lady friend of mine wants to know if she should make public confession of a sin which she committed fifteen years ago and for which the Lord has forgiven her, but concerning which she still feels troubled at times. I told her that it was the Devil who is trying to get her to bring a blot on the church and on herself; am I right in giving this advice? Mrs. H., Calif.

Ans. I believe you are right. No possible good can come from making public confessions of private sins. It must be the Devil who torments your friend and who is attempting to drive her distracted or else into folly and needless disgrace.

Q. When a vacancy occurs on the Board of trustees of a church during the interim of the regular annual meetings of the church, (1) has the pastor authority to appoint the new member or members, (2) has the Church Board or the Board of Trustees authority to elect to fill the vacancies, (3) or should the pastor call the church together and elect according to the Manual of the church? F. N. R., Kansas.

Ans. Since the Manual does not specify any other method, my judgment is that only the last named procedure is correct and legal, and to make sure that even that is legal, the pastor should give "due notice" of this meeting of the church and should announce specifically that the purpose of the meeting is to elect persons to fill vacancies on the Board of Trustees.

 $Q_{\rm AC}$ Why did the Israelites slay Balaam (Joshua 13:22), when he refused to speak anything but the commandment of God? R. R. H., Can.

Ans. Perhaps you have overlooked Numbers 31:16 which inform us that, although Balaam was unable to pronounce a direct curse upon the Israelites, he did counsel the enemies of Israel to form alliances with the Israelites and to inter-marry with them and to lead them into idolatry. The results, from, the evil standpoint we may say the *success*, of his scheme is recorded in the twenty-fifth chapter of Numbers and furnishes full justification for all that the Israelites did to Balaam.

THE REASONABLENESS OF HOLINESS

In Rom. 12:1 we read, "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the merices of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service."

These last three words impress our minds, "*Your reasonable service*" What is our reasonable service? That of presenting ourselves a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God; and the deeper meaning veiled in these words of not only presenting ourselves to Him but letting Him possess our very being in all His fullness as written in Eph. 3:19. "That ye might be filled with all the fullness of God," or in other words made holy by the sanctifying power of God and filled with God.

But many today discount the wonderful? experience of heart holiness saying it is impossible to live without sin and not only impossible but unreasonable. Let us see if this is true. In 1 John 3:8, 9, we read, "He that committeth sin is of the devil; for the devil sinneth from the beginning. For this purpose the Son of God was manifested, that he might destroy the works of the devil. Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin; for his seed remaineth in him; and he cannot sin, because he is born of God." So we see that even a converted man is through with sin according to the Word of God, and after all, this is our authority instead of the ideas and opinions of mere men.

But is it reasonable to demand a life freefrom sin? Let us think a few minutes about the following: Supposing I should say this man is an exceedingly honest man, but once in a while he will pick up something that does not belong to him; oh, he is no thief, he is a very honest man. You immediately say, "Absurd, no man can be an honest man and still be a thief." I grant that. But another man is scrupulously truthful; he is very careful to tell the truth on most occasions; but once in a while, when driven to it by seeming necessity, he will tell a lie. A truthful man, but he will lie once in a while when driven to it, You say, "Impossible! A man cannot tell a lie and yet be a truthful man at the same time." But here is another man; he is what we call a strict prohibitionist; a sober man. But when temptation gets just a little hard he takes a drink and then becomes intoxicated. A sober man and a drunkard at the same time. Absolutely impossible, you will agree.

All right, but here is another man. He is a professing Christian and he declares he must sin a little every day in word, thought and deed. You say, "Certainly that is all right." But let us find out what the word Christian means; it means "Christlike" or "Christ Man." Can a man be like Christ and yet commit sin? No! No! No! It is as impossible to be a sinning Christian as it is to be a truthful liar, or an honest thief, or a sober drunkard.

You say. "Yes, it is reasonable but it is impossible." God knew that you would say that so He swore to us that we could live holy and gave us scriptures to prove it so. Now if it were left to us alone it would be impossible but with God there is nothing impossible.

Others say that it is impossible because we can not live it in this life. 'Let us read Titus 2:12, "Teaching us that, denying un-



godliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly in this present world. Right here where sin is rampant, we can live holy lives in this present world. Then in Luke 1:73-75, "The OATH which he [God] sware unto our father Abraham, That he would grant unto us, that we being delivered out of the hands of our enemies might serve him without fear, In holiness and righteousness before him all the days of our life." So God took OATH that we could live a holy life all the days of our life. If this is true, and thank God it is true, it is not only possible but it is reasonable.

Holiness is reasonable because it is commanded of God through the Psalmist, Psalm 29:2, "Give unto the Lord the glory due his name; worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness." It is described here as a beautiful way. Is it not reasonable that God has

prepared this beautiful way for His children? But in order to worship Him in the beauty of holiness we will first have to get the experience.

Then too it is reasonable because it is the only way to heaven and because of its simplicity. Let us read Isaiah 35:8, "And an highway shall be there, and a way, and it shall be called the way of holiness; The unclean shall not pass over it; but it shall be for those; the wayfaring men, though fools, shall not err therein." But I hear some raise the objection, "My great, great, great grandmother never heard of holiness and she got to heaven, so I guess I'll just go the way she did." Let us see the weakness of this argument by the following illustration:

Two roads start at city A leading to city B. One is an old backwoods road full of holes, and ruts, and the other is a beautiful concrete highway. I am going to city B from city A, and in going down the nice concrete road my attention is called to a peculiar chugchug, and then a pause,—chug-chug and then another pause. I recognize the fact that some one is in trouble over on the other road so I leave my car and go over to see if I can help my friend out of his distress. Arriving on the scene, I find a machine stuck in the mud and the poor driver doing his best to crank it and get it to going, so he can get it out of the mire. I' say to him, "Where' are you going my friend?" He answers, "I, am going to city B." "Where did you start?" "City A." "Well, my friend, what are you doing on this road? . Don't you know there is a fine concrete road that leads to city B. from city A, just about one hundred yards from here?" "Well, yes," he answers, "I've heard about it, but my great, great, great grandmother went over this to city B from city A seventy years ago, and I guess I'll stay on this one and I'll get there bye and bye." Poor fellow, he doesn't know that dear old grandmother went on the very best road that she knew anything about. If the concrete road had been known to her she would have been delighted to have gone on it instead of the old mud road. Then, too, don't you know that the old muddy, rocky road closes just a little way ahead and the only way you will ever get to city B is by getting on the highway?

Then its very simplicity argues its reasonableness. "A way-faring man, though a fool, shall not err therein." Brother, sister, what must be your mental condition if you excuse yourself by saying, "I won't get or seek the experience of holiness, because I do not understand it." Shame! Shame! When God has made it so plain that a fool shall not err therein. We have seen some men whom the world counted mentally deficient, but they showed more common sense than some D. D.'s and LL. D's. in that they really got the experience of heart holiness and exemplified it in their daily lives winning the confidence of the entire town. I remember one such whom I would be delighted to have follow me in my evangelistic campaigns and pray for me and shout the victory. He is an inspiration to any meeting.

The reasonableness of holiness may also be seen from the fact that it is the will of God and is a command of God.

1 Thess. 4:3: "For this is the *will of God*, even your sanctification, that ye abstain from fornication."

1 Peter 1:15, 16: "But as he which hath called you is holy, so be ye holy in all manner of conversation [living]; Because it is written, be ye holy; for I am holy." And we know from the thought in Isaiah 1:8: "Come now and let us reason together, saith the Lord," that He would ask us to do nothing unreasonable.

Lastly, the reasonableness of holiness is doubted by some who say, "Oh, that is just a new doctrine hatched up by the Church of the Nazarene in existence only about thirty years. We would not waste our energy on such an undependable thing." But let us see. Did holiness start with the Church of the Nazarene? No, it did not, but thank God, we believe in it, teach it and praise God a great many of us have it. John Wesley, the father of the Methodist Church, taught this great doctrine about 125 years ago; Madame Guyon had the experience in her day 500 years ago; the Apostles had the experience and taught it throughout their ministry. Jesus taught it, "Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God." Isaiah received the blessing in the year that King Uzziah died, 750 years before Christ. Enoch walked with God with a perfect heart 2000

years before Christ. But let us read Eph. 1:4 and we will find out just how old the doctrine is, "According as he hath chosen us in" him before the joundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before him in love." So we see that God ordained before the foundation of the world that we should live HOLY. Well, that is far enough back for me, so I am perfectly satisfied.

Friends, shall we match our puny ideas and reasoning against God's great and matchless plan? Let us follow the advice of our Brother Paul and perform the reasonable service demanded of us; that of completely yielding to God and letting Him sanctify us wholly. For the Word says in Heb. 12:14, "Follow peace with all men and holiness without which no man shall see the Lord."

The Witness of the Spirit BY REV. W. G. BENNETT

ANY have a notion that the witness of the Spirit is a very blessed privilege, but is after all not absolutely necessary. This is a lamentable mistake. Personal salvation is always accompanied by an assurance of salvation that gives rest of soul, and a confidence that enables one to take the witness stand and declare unequivocally what God has done for his soul: We are not saying now that there may not be times of testing, and in the earlier stages of the religious life, even times of doubt. But, if like Bunyan's Hopeful in the slough of despond, we look about for (the bogs) the promises on which to place our feet, and make times of testing, times of heart searching and prayer, we will come out on the right side of the slough with a strengthened faith and a glory that surpasses all previous experiences. After repeated efforts on the part of the enemy, and repeated victories on your part, Satan will begin to tempt you at other weak points, and these times of despondency will become less frequent. Satan is not as short-sighted as some people who continue to use tactics that bring repeated failures.

We wish to state now that the witness of the Spirit is not as some suppose simply a delightful experience, but is absolutely essential in the propagation of New Testament salvation. Turn to the first chapter of Acts and read the sixth to the eighth verses inclusive. "When they therefore were come together, they asked of him, saying, Lord, wilt thou at this time restore again the kingdom to Israel?" They looked up as though everything depended upon Him, and said, "Wilt thcu?", but He looked down upon these humble men, knowing full well all their natural weaknesses, their poverty, their lack of prestige, and said, "Ye." "And he said unto them; it is not for you to know the times or the seasons, which the Father hath put in his own power. But ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost has come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." We will not discuss power here only to say that, while power and purity are not identical, the baptism with the Holy Ghost which purifies from sin always precedes the enduement with power as to statement, and yet is coetaneous with power as to experience. That is to say, when Jesus baptizes with the Holy Ghost, which baptism purifies from sin, we at the same time receive the omnipotent Holy Ghost which endues with sufficient power to do whatever may be required in the callings and emergencies of life. The old fashioned water mills were without gears. The miller filled the hopper and sat and read while the mill ground slowly away. But in modern times we hitch the same power on to geared

machinery and everything about the mill fairly hums with high tension and power. The Holy Ghost is omnipotent. All we need is to get our souls geared up by faith, and the machinery will hum with power. Power going to waste. Brother, get geared up!

Now as to witnesses: and I want you to note, empowered witnesses. First, a witness is not necessarily an exponent of the law. He is not supposed to preside in court. He does not deal with motives and circumstantial evidence. He leaves that for a jury.' A witness, if he be honest, tells what he knows about the case' in hand in the most simple and direct way possible. He is not attempting to make but a case. He has first hand evidence and gives it without equivocation or pretense, and with a conviction of its veracity that has weight with the jury. Every jury is bound by universal conscience and by oath of office as well to render a decision/according to the evidence given in court, with only two exceptions: vs. First, the mental incompetence of the witness, and second, his impeachment, because he has not a reputation for truth and veracity. But with these exceptions, the jury must accept the evidence of the witnesses and render decision accordingly.

The range of knowledge necessary for men to get converted or sanctified is not very wide. Bishop Taylor frequently had heathen converted the first gospel message they ever heard. Frequently the most devout ministers are less successful in moving men to seek God in their more mature years than they were in the beginning of their ministry. This may be due to the fact that then the range of truth used by them was narrower than later in life.

The church has always needed, and under pentecostal conditions, has always had ministers who played on one string, who preached. and exhorted, and vociferated, and turned again and again in the same tracks, until it got on people's nerves and into their dreams, night and day, making them wretched until they sought and found God. And woe to the Church of the Nazarene, when such men become distasteful to us, and we want only the cultured, refined, and what passes for the efficient." On the other hand, when we fail to appreciate men of profundity and depth, look out for the sand-bars and the rocks. But to return to the subject. I was saying men do not have to have a very wide range of knowledge to get saved. The sinner needs to know, and if he is awakened he wants to know, "Can Jesus put away forever the awful load of sin and guilt that I am carrying about?" "Is Jesus a conqueror, girded with power, to break the chains of evil habit that bind me with awful bondage?" "Can Jesus really lay hold of my warped and depraved nature that loves sin, and so change the currents of my inner being, that I shall love God and righteousness." He is like a dving man, bruised and mangled. He is not greatly interested in the science of medicine. He wants a doctor that can set bones, sew up the wounds, and restore him to health. The testimony of medical students is not worth half so much to him now as the testimonies of men who have been in his condition and have had the cure. A man who has been to the doctor and still has the wounds and unset bones and is still in a dying condition is not in a position to recommend to him the kind of a doctor he wants. He wants a doctor whose cures can be demonstrated in actual practice, and if there is a man present who can take the witness stand and say to the sinner, "I carried for years a load of guilt, but Jesus took it away. I was in awful bondage, but Jesus broke those chains from my life. I loved sin, and the world, and served the Devil, but Jesus changed my whole life, until I love God and righteousness." Now, if this man has in look and in life the demonstration of the cure, the sinner must and will receive his testimony with far greater weight than any argumentative discourse. I have seen revival efforts apparently fail until some man or woman got saved and took the witness stand and then the entire community would be under conviction.

Now all that I have said relative to conversion applies with even greater force to entire sanctification. No one who has heard me preach very much would even suspect that I had an abscess in my right lung. But such was the case. No one will charge me with exalting myself when I testify that my friend, Dr. Movius, performed an operation on me that has wrought a complete cure. I would be guilty of ingratitude to the doctor. and criminal indifference toward my fellowmen if I knew a man who was dying of a like disease, and failed to tell him where to go to be cured. There are people that are so cultured or have inherited such a delightful disposition that unless you were a very close student of human nature, you would not suspect that they had such a thing as carnality.

There is a false notion relative to testimony to the experience of holiness and you will lay yourself liable to a charge of spiritual pride if you are definite, and you will very likely lose the blessing if you are not. Carnal Christians will insist on your (living the life and saying nothing about it. To yield here is to compromise, please the Devil, but not God. If one should live the life and not give the glory to Jesus, it would infer that your virtue was your own, and hence exalt yourself and minister to natural pride. But, to declare humbly on all proper occasions that you are cleansed from inbred depravity through the merits of Jesus' precious blood is to honor Him as an Almighty Savior, and is of assistance to others who are striving against depravity to step into the fountain of cleansing and be made every whit whole.

Logic can be answered or resisted, but axiomatic truth is irresistible. The opposite is unthinkable. Hamilton, the metaphysician, said, "That which is known to consciousness, life; strong and determined to trust God and defy is absolute knowledge." the Devil; no thought of murder either yourse

Every regenerated and sanctified soul has conscious knowledge, axiomatic and absolute, of these two great epochs in Christian experience. Mr. Wesley said, "I judge that a man having this witness of the Spirit, it would be as possible for him to be mistaken as for God to lie." Where this witness of the Spirit is obtained and retained, there is an inner tranquility, an outward radiance of glory, a deathless profound reality, an idomitable courage that makes a man walk the earth with a conqueror's tread, and when he takes the witness stand, there is a ring about his testimony, that has far greater weight than the profoundest logic. Nothing can stand before the church that can raise up witnesses like these.

The Suicide Devil By REV. C. E. CORNELL

(The following report of Brother Cornell's sermon appeared in "The Daily Report," Ontario, Calif.— EDITOR.)

Suicide Does Not End It All

T the Church of the Nazarene last night the Rev. C. E. Cornell spoke on the "Suicide Devil, or Do All Suicides Go to Hell?" Rev. Cornell said in part:

The suicide Devil is on the job working night and day. He is the awful and tircless enemy of the race and hounds men, women and little children until they listen to his siren voice and commit selfmurder and plunge into an awful eternity. The statistics for the past few years are appalling. In 1921, 8,410 males and 3,734 females committed suicide in the United States. In 1922, 13,530 persons committed suicide, making a total for the two years of 25,676. Add to these figures the unknown suicides and the unsuccessful attempt to destroy themselves and the figures would be doubled, making more than 50,000 persons who committed suicide or attempted to do so. Think of it—this in two years in the United States alone!

ALL WALKS OF LIFE

"All walks of life are represented. The educated, those socially prominent and financially prosperous. Among the number last year there were thirty-eight college students, fifty college professors and school teachers, nineteen preachers and leaders of religious work, fifty-two judges and lawyers, eighty-four physicians, about one hundred presidents and heads of large business concerns, seventy-nine millionaires, forty-six wealthy women, and eighty-eight bankers and bank presidents. In New-York City alone 839 persons ended their lives last year. In some parts of the country there seems to be an epidemic of suicides. Ontario has had a number within a few months. A suicides girls' club has been discovered."

Rev. Cornell then gave a number of causes for suicide. Despondency, despair, discouragement, financial reverses, poverty, sickness, sorrow, losses, bosses, drink, heavy burdens, mental derangement. Several persons killed themselves because of gossip. One girl committed suicide because she became depressed after bobbing her hair; one man because he was forced to quit playing golf. A woman killed herself after missing two trains. A man because he feared the end of the world was at hand. Another man because of a row over a cat. A designer was driven to suicide trying to guess the coming spring styles for women. One recently ended his life because he would not face another cold winter. A young man killed himself "for the fun of it."

A woman left a note saying she was taking poison "just to get a new thrill."

MANY WERE CHILDREN

"Sadder it would seem than any other phase of this serious subject is the fact that many who take their own lives were children. In 1919, 477 children committed suicide; in 1920 there were 707; in 1921, 858; in 1922 over 900, or nearly 3,000 in four years. This is startling and ought to make every serious man sit up and take notice. The average age of the boy suicides was sixteen years and that of girls fifteen. Five school girls committed suicide within four days.

"Why these suicides of children? The conclusion in the minds of many will be temperamentally disordered, or home conditions are intolerable, or, perhaps the school system is at fault. All three are no doubt reasons for child suicide. Child marriages are another serious cause. Girls meet a young man one day and are married the next. This is a frightful blunder and promotive of suicide. "Courtships ought to be extended over months and in some cases a year or so.

"Fourteen, fifteen and sixteen year-old girls have no business getting married. They are literally fools to do so. Yet this thing goes merrily on. In 1920 there were 1,600 boys and 12,000 girls fifteen years of age in the United States listed as married, and nearly 500 of these recorded as widowed or divorced. The married boys of sixteen numbered 3,222; those of seventeen, 7,960; those of eighteen, 24,644. Girls married at sixteen, 41,620; at seventeen, 90,930 and at eighteen, 186,645. Many of these puppy-love sissies soon after marriage find that they made a great mistake in their choice, quarrel, separate and get a divorce and then supply many of our suicides as well as homicides. Parents and teachers should faithfully warn their children in this respect. Am I not correct in saying that for various reasons the suicide Devil is surely getting in his work.

NO KNOWLEDGE OF THEIR SOULS

"Large numbers of individuals never darken the doors of a church; they never read a Bible, they have no knowledge of the value of their souls; they live on a plane bul little above the beasts of the field. They think to commit self-murder is the end of it How fearful is their mistake! The scriptures say 1 John 3:15, 'No murderer hath eternal life abiding in him.' One may not believe the Bible and may spurn its teachings, but that does not change the Word one iota. For a wicked man or woman to kill themselves is to jump quickly into hell. Instead of ending 'all,' to commit suicide is the beginning of an endless eternity of anguish and inexpressible despair. Better look before you leap.

"The suicide Devil is on the track right now of many an individual. He hounds the mind, harasses the life, annoys and teases until the mind is all taken up with the thought of self-murder. The victim gets to a place where it seems impossible to shake the Devil off. Then the awful deed is done and the soul plunges into hell.

"There is but one remedy for suicide and that is the gospel of Jesus Christ. I do not mean just profession, but possession. A supreme trust and confidence in God. He is able to help the individual to meet the hard places of life and conquer. Not many true Christians ever commit suicide. 'Casting all your care upon Him for He careth for you.' In the extreme hour of temptation He will make a way of escape. Brave to meet the exigencies of

fe; strong and determined to trust God and defy the Devil; no thought of murder either yourself or some one else; such a thought is horrifying. 'God is still on the throne, keeping watch above His own.' 'He will not suffer the righteous to be moved.'

"Fight the suicide Devil, resent his subtle attack, do not consent to listen to his hellish suggestion. if you do he will drag you down to hell."

A WAYSIDE OPERATION

HILE making a trip over the mountains recently to visit one of our Mission Stations and to call upon some of the sick and administer to their physical suffering, I sighted in the distance coming over the trail a number of natives and a white man carrying a hammock. As they came nearer I found that they had a native boy about twelve years old in the hammock, whom they were taking to the hospital for surgical attention. On examination I found that his feg was ripped open from knee to ankle, wide enough to lay your hand in. They told me that he was riding a donkey, seated astride a pack-saddle which had four hooks, two on either side to hang bags on. The donkey had bucked and thrown the boy, and as he went out of the saddle one of these hooks had caught his leg making this ugly wound. The wound was filled with dust/ and dirt of all kinds and the boy was filthy. The dirt in the wound had served one good purpose at least, and that was to clot the blood and prevent him from bleeding to death. The hour was late so I would not have time to return to the hospital and also make my other calls that day. As it happened there was a small mountain stream nearby, and convenient shade, so I had my patient laid out by the side of the stream while I made preparations for the operation. Fortunately I had in my saddle bags about everything needed for the operation. After syringing and bathing the leg and wound I took the necessary stitches to inclose the wound. My patient proved to be quite a brave soldier, and with an exceptional grunt and uttering of the word, "Mi-ba-be," which means that something very unusual is taking place, he made no resistance or complaint. After I had dressed the leg he was taken back to the white man's home

We desire to express to our superintendents, pastors, people, and friends our heartfelt appreciation for their loyal support of our missionary interests during the year. We know that many have sacrificed in order to give. We know that many have prayed daily that the great work of God in heathen lands might go on uninterrupted because of financial difficulties. God has heard and answered prayer. We give Him the glory and thank our people for all they have done to make the thirteenth annual victory one of the greatest and to some one of the most unexpected victories in our history.

Shall we begin now to pray and believe that God will again reveal Himself during the year 1924 and that every need shall be supplied? He is abundantly able and willing that we should accomplish the task that He has faid upon us. We must not fail Him. We must press on in greater faith and with a greater vision and with a greater determination to do His work than ever before.

where he was working. In three weeks the leg was quite nicely healed and the boy was able to get about with a stick for a cane. In such cases we would expect to lose the leg from infection, but the Lord undertook for us and we are praying that this boy will turn out to be a brave soldier for Jesus. Will you not pray for him? These people can teach us many lessons in bravery and endurance, "especially when it comes to physical suffering.

WAR CREEK MISSION AS I SEE IT

Forasmuch as many have taken in hand to set forth in order a declaration of those things which are most surely done at War Creek, Ky, it seemed good to me also, having just spent a few days there, to write unto thee, most excellent Nazarenes. \bullet

First, I might say that I was very agreeably surprised to find conditions as much in our favor as they really are there. I was under the impression that most of the people were unable to read, but I learned that out of a class of thirty-five children between the ages of eleven and sixteen that twentyone could read, and most of them were able to commit a passage of Scripture to memory each week. A much greater per cent of the older ones could read, Sister Coleman told me, but their education is limited. Upon learning these facts I was greatly encouraged as I thought of how our people would delight to send them religious books which will mean so much in the way of aid to the missionaries in enlightening them.

Then I was delighted to find that our God sent missionaries had so captured the hearts of the mountain folks. They declared that Sister Coleman is the greatest preacher in the country, and that Sister Harding, the nurse, is the best doctor they know. The women seem to love the people equally as well, and are simply pouring out their lives for them.

At eight o'clock Sunday morning they were gathering for Sunday school and before nine it was opened with more than seventy-five present. The lesson was discussed far more freely than I had expected to hear it by the classes, and by ten o'clock they had closed and were ready to turn the service over to the preacher, some twenty-five more having come in since the opening of the Sunday school.

When I had finished my sermon I gave the invitation to which thirty-seven quickly responded. Being no more room in or near the altar I asked all that would to kneel where they were, and I do not think more than three in the house failed to bow. Some eight or ten testified to saving grace, but seemed very timid while doing so, although they were deeply broken up and the tears were flowing freely. This lady had been a reader of the *Pentecostal Herald* for years, and really has the blessing. She has a nice Sunday school organized in her home by the missionaries, and we were greatly surprised to find the good class of people from that community who were assembled there. I preached at night and helped to arrange for the ercction of a nice Nazarene chapel in that community. The man agreed to give us the land and one-half of the material for it, and some others

After an all night rain we arose to enjoy a beautiful morning visit with the family, a few of the neighbors that had gathered in to bid us adieu and one in a near by home before trying to make our way back through the swift streams to War Creek.

On our return trip the writer had the pleasure of riding a mule, much of the time with his feet upon the burden bearer's-neck, as the swift current dashed 'around the saddle fenders while floating down the "road." A number of times I thought of Cartwright's experience as we would leave the creek and make our way around the mountain side where there had never even been a pathway beaten out.

Under the good providence of the Almighty we landed safely at the mission cottage again and made ready for a Monday night service in the little chapel there. It had rained until we had only thirteen present, but seven of the number responded to the altar call, and we felt that it was really worth while to have held the service.
