Few come with other purposes than receiving spiritual help.

Each morning at 7:30 a.m. in the Alumni Auditorium students gather to pray and to listen to a few minutes of expounded truth before attending their classes for the day. This prayer service was instigated by the Tennessee Club to help the spiritual life of students. Your day runs much smoother if you dedicate it to the Lord. Why not attend?

Which shall it be? In this article we wish to picture two situations in which a student at Trevecca Nazarene College is requesting employment from the person in charge of student work.

In the first situation let us suppose that a student knocks on the door of the office of the Business Manager and upon admission introduces himself as follows:

"I am Arthur Hardison from Newport, Mississippi. I expect to enroll in Trevecca as a Freshman in College. However, I have some financial problems and I need part time work in order to pay my expenses."

To this introduction and request the Business Manager replies as follows:

"I am very glad to know you, Mr. Hardison. We have had some very fine students from the State of Mississippi. Your problem of insufficient finances with which to get an education is no new one to us. We have many applications from worthy students for part time work. It is no little responsibility to supply all of the students who make application for work with a job. However, it is a pleasure to assign jobs to Trevecca students for several reasons."

"In the first place, Trevecca students in the main are conscientious young people. A person who is conscientious about his work will not loaf on the job; he will strive to earn his money."

"In the second place, boys and girls in college are in position to approach a task with a student view point. They find out all the details of their job, they learn to do their work better and in less time each time they do the job."

"In the third place, I found Trevecca students to be dependable. They seem to realize that the welfare of the school as a whole depends upon everyone doing the task that has been assigned to him."

"We members of the Administration feel that part time work may supplement a student's education. Many boys and girls have never known how to work with their hands sufficiently until they attended a school like Trevecca. Boys have begun working at trades such as electricians, plumbers, carpenters, and painters on the experience which they received while working on the campus of a school like Trevecca. Girls have gotten experience in the library and in the offices which has helped them to get good jobs as librarians and secretaries. We consider good work as acceptable as cash in payment for tuition and fees. I shall be happy to assign you a part time job and I trust that you will find it pleasant here at Trevecca."

Now let us suppose for the other situation that a student knocks on the door of the office of the Business Manager, introduces himself and makes the same request.

"I am Arthur Hardison from Newport, Mississippi. I expect to enroll in Trevecca as a Freshman in College. However, I have some financial problems and I need part time work in order to pay my expenses."

"I am very glad to know you Mr. Hardison. We have some very fine students from the State of Mississippi. May I congratu-

late you on your choice to get an education in a Christian College.

To this introduction and request the Business Manager replies as follows:

I am sorry that you are faced with the problem of financing your education. We used to have a student work program at Trevecca. We were able to give the students part time work, enabling them to receive compensation for work assigned to them. We used student labor for firing the furnaces, cleaning class rooms, rest rooms and halls, maintenance and general repair. However, the program was very unsatisfactory. The students had too many distractions to do satisfactory work. Their interests were divided between classes, social life, and recreation. When we wanted a student to do a task, he was either in class, visiting with his girl friend, or at play. We assigned the students to such tasks as emptying trash cans, cleaning rest rooms, class rooms and halls. It seemed that continually the trash cans ran over with paper, the rest rooms were littered with paper towels, the basins were dirty, and the atmosphere was filled with stench. The class room furniture was dusty and the halls were tracked with mud and littered with chewing gum and candy wrappers. We were fearful at what visitors might say if they should come and we were miserably embarrassed when they would come in. Frequently the buildings were cold and there was no hot water. Upon inquiry the work supervisor discovered that the fireman had quit his job without reporting to the work supervisor, or the fireman had gone home for the weekend leaving a friend in charge of his work, who forgot his responsibility."

"To look at our beautiful campus and well kept buildings now, Mr. Hardison, it is difficult to realize what an untidy situation we had when we used student labor. We are now using full time men and women to take care of our buildings and grounds with about one-half the expense. Whereas we used to pay student labor around \$160.00 a week, for janitor service, we now have better service at about \$15.00 a week."

"Since we have discontinued our student work program we are not able to offer part time work to even the most worthy and promising students. However, we do have a plan by which we are able to help prospective students in your position. Having recognized our maintenance program on a more economical basis, we are able to offer half tuition scholarships to more students. A student is given help on the basis of character, educational promise, and need. By

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giving a student a half tuition scholarship instead of a part time job we are enabling him to put more time to study and preparation for class work."

"I would suggest that you submit an application to the Committee on Scholarships for their consideration of your case."

"I might suggest a few places of business in the City of Nashville where you might secure employment."

Either of these two situations may be true in the near future. It is within the power of the working students at Trevecca Nazarene College to chose which one they prefer.
