Long-Range Expansion Program Is Planned

Ground-breaking ceremonies for a new fine arts building—the first building in what is expected to be a \$2,000,000, 10-year expansion program at Trevecca Nazarene College—will be held at noon Tuesday.

Ceremonies for the beginning of work on the \$120,000 arts structure are planned to coincide with the school's celebration of its 50th anniversary and its commencement program.

Dr. A. B. Mackey, president of Trevecca explained that the long-range expansion program calls for new dormitories, an infirmary and classroom buildings.

The school, which is the only one supported by the Church of the Nazarene in the Southeastern Educational Zone, was founded in 1901. It is located on Murfreesboro Road at the city limits.

The Baccalaureate Service of the graduating class was held in the Alumni Auditorium, Sunday, June 3, at 2:30 p.m. The processional was played by the College orchestra and the procession was led by Julia Ann Sullivan and Champ Traylor, juniors with the highest scholastic average in their class. The College choir was featured with two numbers.

Dr. S. S. White of Kansas City, former president of Trevecca, delivered the address. Dr. White is the editor of the Herald of Holiness, the official weekly publication of the Church. He received his A.B. degree from Peniel College, M.A. from Brown University, and his B.D. from Drew Theological Seminary. After receiving his Ph.D. from Chicago University he taught for about ten years at Bethany-Peniel College. He was also a member of Olivet faculty. While a professor at the Nazarene Theological Seminary in 1948 he was elected to his present post. Dr. White is not only a teacher, journalist, and one time college president, but also a forceful speaker and greatly inspired the graduates with his message.


Mrs. Keys and Mrs. Hardy were also given gifts as tokens of the choir's appreciation for their work.

There I stood as the proud leader and it seemed for a moment that the entire company of corn-stalks became animate as an unseen force moved them. THANKS TO TREVECCANS



the year, we want to thank you for giving us the privilege of serving you in the capacity we have. Your attitudes and responses have made it a joy.


