Among the outstanding speakers of the week January 19-23, Sammy Sparks and Rev. Cockran highlighted the week. January 22nd the student body and faculty were privileged to hear our internationally known youth speaker, Sammy Sparks. His dynamic personality held the attention of the audience while he spoke on "The Christian Machine," love...the oil; power and a sound mind being the parts. He said he decided long ago a Christian must not let the world get the best of him, recalling the time when in high school a class mate called "Preacher, let's have a prayer meeting." Sammy Sparks promptly asked the boy to bow his head.

His method of presentation, humorous outlook and "Sparkling" personality makes Rev. Sammy Sparks one of the outstanding evangelists of our church today.

On Wednesday of this week Rev. Cockran brought us in accented tones an informational message on the progress of the work of the church in Argentina of which he is the district superintendent. Buenos Aires, the capitol, is the key center. They plan to make other large centers as headquarters also and to radiate out from these into the more rural areas. He brought to us the economic progress of the country, showing how the old customs are rapidly giving way to modern methods. "In five years these old customs will not be found in the country," Rev. Cockran predicted. Rev. Cockran is originally from Georgia but has lived in Argentina for sixteen years.



For the hot shots in the basketball race keep your eye trained this way.


