## Boody To Give Speech Recital



A unique presentation of a story will be given when Leona Boody, a senior, delivers her speech recital in the Alumni Auditorium, April 24. Miss Boody, a speech major, will dramatize the prize-winning book, **Who Walk Alone** by Perry Burgess. The musical accompaniment will be rendered by LaVera Applegate.

**Who Walk Alone** is the story of Ned Langford, an ordinary young midwestern American, who learned that something so terrible had happened to him that it would send him into lifelong exile on a distant tropical island. It is the story of a man who faced one of the most tragic of human disasters—leprosy—and yet managed to wring from it a rich, useful, undaunted life.

Miss Boody's recital promises to be one of the most interesting we have had at Trevecca and well worth an effort to attend.


**Ball 'N Strikes**
