BACCALAUREATE, GRADUATION TO CLIMAX YEAR

Dr. Harold Reed To Give Address On June 9



Graduation, the long-awaited event for the group of thirty-one seniors, will soon be here. The graduation exercises will be on Tuesday, June 9, at 8:00 p.m. in the Alumni Auditorium. Dr. Harold W. Reed of Kankakee, Illinois will deliver the Commencement Address.

Dr. Reed has been president of Olivet Nazarene College in Kankakee since 1949. He has had valuable experience as both pastor and educator. Entering the pastoral field in 1933, he has held charges at Loveland, Colorado; Junction City and Newton, Kansas; and Huntington, Indiana. From 1936 to 1940 he was president of Bresee College, Hutchison, Kansas; and he has also taught at Pasadena College, Pasadena, California, and Bethany-Peniel College, Bethany, Oklahoma.

Dr. Reed received the A.B. degree from Colorado College; the M.S. from Colorado State College; and the Th.D. degree from the University of Southern California. He is a member of the General Board, chief administrative body of the Church of the Nazarene.

Final Chapel Service

Will Be June 9

Tuesday, June 9 will witness the final gathering for a chapel service of this school year. The awards and honors for this year's achievements will be presented.



DR. GROSS IS BANQUET SPEAKER

Dr. John O. Cross, secretary of the Board of Christian Education for the Methodist Church delivered the main address at the annual Junior-Senior Banquet which was held May 19th at 8:00 p.m. in the college cafeteria.

Dr. Gresham gave the invocation followed by the reading of "Invictus" by Lavonne Jernigan. William Hill sang "Stout-Hearted Men" Toast Master Jack Archer presented President Grant Browning of the Junior Class. Grant welcomed the Seniors and told what heredity has meant because we are a product of the past. Three factors make us what we are: The Past, Our Environment, and Ourselves. The greatest determining force, however, is our own self. Dale Hilbert, president of the graduating class, responded emphasizing the importance of our environment. The Junior Quartet composed of Richard Shomo, Jim Millard, Paul Hess and Jack Archer sang, "Look Away to Heaven" and "I Want My Life to Count."


